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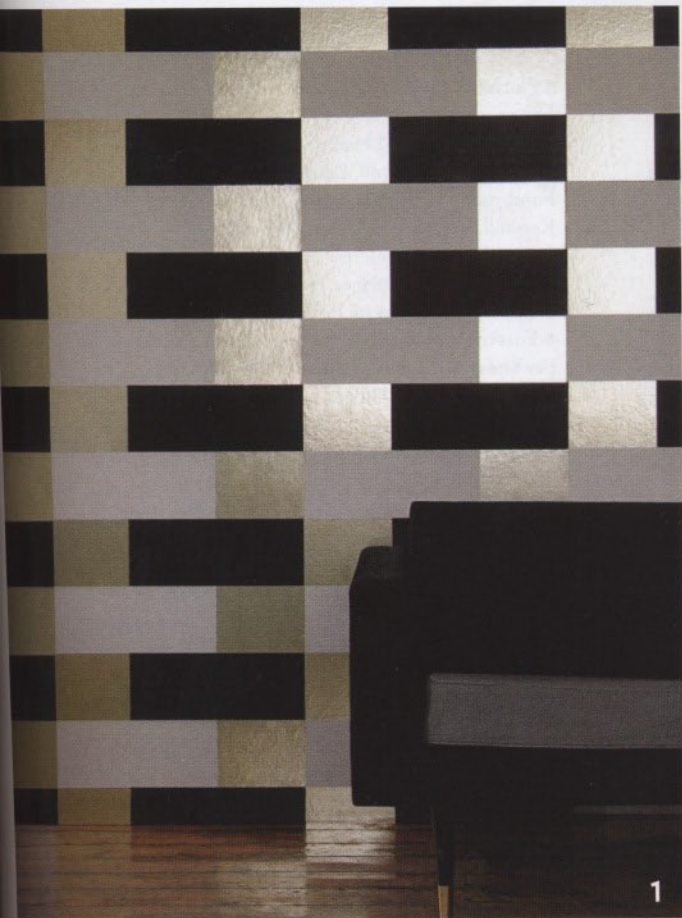

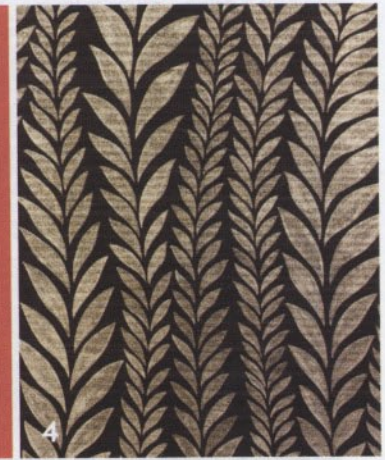

gives a finish that you wouldn't be able to achieve on a machine, which is why it will be twice the price of other papers.'

Many long-established wallpaper companies still make their wallpapers using traditional techniques, but have brought their **archive prints into the 21st century** by editing and reprinting them at different scales or with contemporary colours.

There's also a wealth of innovative and exciting modern patterns and finishes to choose from. 'Big, baroque designs have been popular for the past few years, and the most up-to-date interpretations of these **designs are more tonal, for example grey on grey,**' says Liz Cann, design director at Zoffany. 'Metallics have also been around for a while, but now we're also seeing more **pearlised and iridescent inks,** and designs with a bit of a sheen, as well as smaller-scale, prettier prints.'

Leafy, woodland motifs and twig-like flourishes are also hot for 2009, as are sharp geometrics and textural papers. Previously considered a style no-no, 'vinyl has come on in leaps and bounds', says Liz. 'These papers are perfect for areas of heavy wear, such as a hallway, and can be printed and embossed to look like silks or textural surfaces such as raffia or cloth.' >
